Looking at American society today and its current economic, social and political events, Ghitea has decided to use his experience living in a socialist society for almost two decades to project current events into the future and to create a fictional novel about a future America. His story explains how, after a cyber attack results in the crash of the stock market, plunging America into a new Depression, a totalitarian government is voted into power. Touted as the foundation of a new electronic financial system and the salvation of the American economy, the new government takes total control of the private sector and the personal lives of citizens by implanting a microchip into the hand of all Americans. The novel introduces Ryan Gibson, manager of advanced microprocessor and networking research at a large semiconductor manufacturer in Portland, Oregon, who is tired of the rat race and decides to take some time off and sail across the Pacific. He and his wife, stranded on an island for three years, finally return to America and are shocked to discover it has changed from a capitalist to a socialist society where the government is in total control. When the government offers Ryan a chance to finish his work, he decides to take advantage of it in his attempt to bring back freedom and democracy and reverse the course of history. In the book, the author points out not just how, but why something like this could happen in the not so distant future. "The book is fictional, but provides a lot of technical details on how this can truly happen in America," Ghitea says. "It provides realism and an air of concern that fiction could turn into reality someday, given the fact that technology many times outpaces legislation. To keep your freedom you have to be ever vigilant."
